


English - "Nine for Nine"

Holocaust Memorial Day

Holocaust Memorial Day takes place every year on 27th January.

Students have been learning about the Holocaust in assemblies and tutor time.

Students and staff at HPA were encouraged to take part in Holocaust Memorial Day by lighting a candle and placing it in their window at 8pm.

The candles were lit to remember those who lost their lives during



genocides, as well as to make a stand against modern prejudice.

Thackray Museum Trip

Year 9 History Department trip to Thackray Medical Museum 105 Year 9 GCSE history students went to Thackray Museum in Leeds on Wednesday 12th January. There were many highlights, for example: The Victorian operating theatre where people would be operated on without anaesthetic (just bite down on this bit of wood - you'll be fine); Disease Street where you can find out the hazards your character faced in the 1800s (if you were really poor you didn't even have a bed to call your own); breakthroughs in medicine such as the discovery of germs, surgery to reattach a damaged hand, the government taking responsibility for health...and we didn't even see it all.

It was a great day, confirmed by the email we received later complimenting us on the "impeccable" behaviour and politeness of our students and their engagement in the museum. Thanks everyone, we will be back next year.



Anti-Bullying

As part of our anti-bullying work, Hall Park has joined up with the Princess Diana Trust to train up students as anti-bullying ambassadors. We have 50 students signed up across all year groups who will be externally trained to lead on educating the other students on issues surrounding bullying.



The Diana Award's Anti-Bullying work is supported by HRH The Duke of Cambridge and engages young people, parents and adults to change the attitudes, behaviour and culture of bullying by building skills and confidence and addressing different situations.

Students will lead on a number of key projects in the build up to the celebration day on July 13th, when students will celebrate the fact, 'It is good to be me.'.

We have combined this with a project we are working with the anti—bullying alliance, with students completing a questionnaire and identifying key areas and groups to be worked on.

MFL A-Level & Beyond evening.

"Languages are a lens through which to see the world" Inspirational words at the MFL A-Level & Beyond evening.

Earlier this year, our Y9,10 and 11 Languages students were invited to take part in a webinar organised by the Redhill Trust in conjunction with The University of Birmingham. This was an excellent opportunity to find out more about where languages can take you post GCSE and A-Level. There were some inspirational talks by current A-Level Language students and also staff and students on languages courses at university. The A-Level students spoke about how they loved to learn about French cinema and literature and how they enjoy researching youth culture in France, such as fashion and music. Dr. Caroline Ardrey who is the admissions tutor for Modern Languages at Birmingham University, spoke about the combinations students often take with a language after A-Levels.

There are so many possibilities such as Language and History, Language and Business, Language and Music plus many more. She also mentioned other languages which can be learnt abinitio (from beginner level) at university alongside studying French and German, such as Spanish, Japanese and Russian.

Dr. Gavin Byrne who is a Law lecturer made it clear that despite Law being a competitive course to get on to at University, an A-Level in a language and studying a language alongside Law can often make it easier to get on a course and can even lower the entry requirements. The speakers really emphasised that whatever you are interested in can be pursued through Modern Languages. Merci and Danke to all of the fantastic speakers and to Mr Gilwhite, Trust Director for MFL, who put the webinar together. There will be another opportunity for KS4 students to watch the recording later in the year.

Message From Finance

Lunch Accounts

Please note if your child is in receipt of free school meals the allowance is $\pounds 2.30$ per day. The hot meal of the day is priced at $\pounds 2.30$ and this includes the main meal (vegetarian option available), a piece of fruit or dessert of the day and a carton of juice. Alongside the hot meal of the day we serve jacket potatoes, pasta with a choice of sauces, and other various hot and cold items. If your child purchases items over the limit of $\pounds 2.30$ then any additional costs need to be paid via your ParentPay account. If you do not want your child to go over their limit please let Finance know ASAP and we can put a block on your childs account.

If your child is not in receipt of free school meals and you also do not want them to have the option of spending money in the canteen, please let Finance know so we can also put a note on your childs account to prevent you from going into arrears.

Please can we ask you to check and make sure that all unpaid monies are cleared by the end of this school term. Please also ensure your childs account is in credit for their return to school. Post-16 applications

This year we have again received another high number of applications including a big increase from students attending other local 11-16 schools. We are using the new Admissions+ application system and applicants have all been interviewed in January by Mr Leach, Mr Crossley or Mr West. We encourage all students to continue working hard to achieve their target and wish them luck with the second set of mock exams next month. With a very uncertain outlook for the jobs market, we encourage anyone who has not yet applied to consider applying for the Sixth form to enable to them to have a secure place for two years and to work towards recognised and highly regarded qualifications. University and apprenticeships

Our Year 13 students have made their applications to university with almost 80% of the cohort applying by the 26th January deadline. Yet again this year, more of our students than ever before have applied to top tier universities and more than usual are planning to study outside of Nottinghamshire which is encouraging. Most students have already received some university offers back and some of these are the highly sought after unconditional offers.

Other students actively seeking an apprenticeship will be attending sessions on national apprenticeship schemes and degree apprenticeships as well as the opportunity to take part in a large number of virtual events. Many of these events coincide with the National Apprenticeship week the week commencing 7th February.

Holocaust Memorial Day

The Sixth Form took part in Holocaust Memorial day on the 27th January with a tutor time tutorial and many students tuned into the live commemoration ceremony online that evening. Following the ceremony, people were encouraged to light a candle to be a light in the darkness'.

Year 13 Moving On Day
